2.1 Introduction




Fig. 1: BK1120 and BK1150 - EtherCAT Bus Coupler for K-bus terminals

The Bus Couplers BK1120 and BK1150 connect EtherCAT with the tried and tested Beckhoff K-bus terminals (KLxxx). A station consists of a BK1120 / BK1150 Bus Coupler, any number of K-bus terminals (up to 64, or up to 255 with K-bus extension) and a bus end terminal. The Bus Coupler recognizes the connected terminals and automatically allocates them into the EtherCAT process image. The Bus Coupler is connected to the network via the upper Ethernet interface. The lower RJ45 socket may be used to connect further EtherCAT devices in the same segment. In the EtherCAT network, the BK1120 / BK1150 Bus Coupler can be installed anywhere in the Ethernet signal transfer section (100BASE-TX) – except directly at the switch. The Bus Couplers BK9000 (for K-bus terminals) and EK1000 (for E-bus terminals) are suitable for application at the switch.




Fig. 2: BK1250 - Coupler between E-bus and K-bus terminals




Fig. 3: Transition from E-bus to K-bus

The BK1250 is a "Bus Coupler in the terminal housing" for mixed application of EtherCAT terminals (ELxxxx) and standard Bus Terminals (KLxxxx) in a bus station. It allows implementation of compact and cost-effective control solutions. The wide range of more than 300 available Bus Terminals (incl. special terminals) can thus be optimally combined with the communication speed and large bandwidth of EtherCAT terminals. Up to 64 Bus Terminals (with K-bus extension up to 255) can be connected to a BK1250. The Bus Coupler recognizes the connected Bus Terminals and automatically allocates them into the EtherCAT process image.

3 Basic principles

3.1 System properties

Protocol

The EtherCAT protocol is optimized for process data and is transported directly within the Ethernet frame thanks to a special Ether-type. It may consist of several sub-telegrams, each serving a particular memory area of the logical process images that can be up to 4 gigabytes in size. The data sequence is independent of the physical order of the Ethernet terminals in the network; addressing can be in any order. Broadcast, Multicast and communication between slaves are possible. Transfer directly in the Ethernet frame is used in cases where EtherCAT components are operated in the same subnet as the control computer.

However, EtherCAT applications are not limited to a subnet: EtherCAT UDP packs the EtherCAT protocol into UDP/IP datagrams. This enables any control with Ethernet protocol stack to address EtherCAT systems. Even communication across routers into other subnets is possible. In this variant, system performance obviously depends on the real-time characteristics of the control and its Ethernet protocol implementation. The response times of the EtherCAT network itself are hardly restricted at all: the UDP datagram only has to be unpacked in the first station.




Fig. 4: EtherCAT Telegram Structure

Protocol structure: The process image allocation is freely configurable. Data are copied directly in the I/O terminal to the desired location within the process image: no additional mapping is required. The available logical address space is with very large (4 GB).

Topology

Line, tree or star: EtherCAT supports almost any topology. The bus or line structure known from the fieldbuses thus also becomes available for Ethernet. Particularly useful for system wiring is the combination of line and junctions or stubs. The required interfaces exist on the couplers; no additional switches are required. Naturally, the classic switch-based Ethernet star topology can also be used.




Fig. 5: EtherCAT Topology

Maximum wiring flexibility: with or without switch, line or tree topologies, can be freely selected and combined.

Wiring flexibility is further maximized through the choice of different cables. Flexible and cost-effective standard Ethernet patch cables transfer the signals in Ethernet mode (100Base-TX). The complete bandwidth of the Ethernet network - such as different optical fibers and copper cables - can be used in combination with switches or media converters.

Distributed Clocks

Accurate synchronization is particularly important in cases where spatially distributed processes require simultaneous actions. This may be the case, for example, in applications where several servo axes carry out coordinated movements simultaneously.

The most powerful approach for synchronization is the accurate alignment of distributed clocks, as described in the new IEEE 1588 standard. In contrast to fully synchronous communication, where synchronization quality suffers immediately in the event of a communication fault, distributed aligned clocks have a high degree of tolerance vis-à-vis possible fault-related delays within the communication system.

With EtherCAT, the data exchange is fully based on a pure hardware machine. Since the communication utilizes a logical (and thanks to full-duplex Fast Ethernet also physical) ring structure, the mother clock can determine the run-time offset to the individual daughter clocks simply and accurately - and vice versa. The distributed clocks are adjusted based on this value, which means that a very precise network-wide timebase with a jitter of significantly less than 1 microsecond is available.

However, high-resolution distributed clocks are not only used for synchronization, but can also provide accurate information about the local timing of the data acquisition. For example, controls frequently calculate velocities from sequentially measured positions. Particularly with very short sampling times, even a small temporal jitter in the displacement measurement leads to large step changes in velocity. With EtherCAT new, extended data types are introduced as a logical extension (time stamp and oversampling data type). The local time is linked to the measured value with a resolution of up to 10 ns, which is made possible by the large bandwidth offered by Ethernet. The accuracy of a velocity calculation then no longer depends on the jitter of the communication system. It is orders of magnitude better than that of measuring techniques based on jitter-free communication.

Performance

EtherCAT reaches new dimensions in network performance. Protocol processing is purely hardware-based through an FMMU chip in the terminal and DMA access to the network card of the master. It is thus independent of protocol stack run-times, CPU performance and software implementation. The update time for 1000 I/Os is only 30 μ s - including terminal cycle time. Up to 1486 bytes of process data can be exchanged with a single Ethernet frame - this is equivalent to almost 12000 digital inputs and outputs. The transfer of this data quantity only takes 300 μ s.

The communication with 100 servo axes only takes 100 μ s. During this time, all axes are provided with set values and control data and report their actual position and status. Distributed clocks enable the axes to be synchronized with a deviation of significantly less than 1 microsecond.

The extremely high performance of the EtherCAT technology enables control concepts that could not be realized with classic fieldbus systems. For example, the Ethernet system can now not only deal with velocity control, but also with the current control of distributed drives. The tremendous bandwidth enables status information to be transferred with each data item. With EtherCAT, a communication technology is available that matches the superior computing power of modern Industrial PCs. The bus system is no longer the bottleneck of the control concept. Distributed I/Os are recorded faster than is possible with most local I/O interfaces. The EtherCAT technology principle is scalable and not bound to the baud rate of 100 Mbaud – extension to Gbit Ethernet is possible.

Diagnostics

Experience with fieldbus systems shows that availability and commissioning times crucially depend on the diagnostic capability. Only faults that are detected quickly and accurately and which can be precisely located can be corrected quickly. Therefore, special attention was paid to exemplary diagnostic features during the development of EtherCAT.

During commissioning, the actual configuration of the I/O terminals should be checked for consistency with the specified configuration. The topology should also match the saved configuration. Due to the built-in topology recognition down to the individual terminals, this verification can not only take place during system start-up, automatic reading in of the network is also possible (configuration upload).

Bit faults during the transfer are reliably detected through evaluation of the CRC checksum: The 32 bit CRC polynomial has a minimum hamming distance of 4. Apart from breaking point detection and localization, the protocol, physical transfer behavior and topology of the EtherCAT system enable individual quality monitoring of each individual transmission segment. The automatic evaluation of the associated error counters enables precise localization of critical network sections. Gradual or changing sources of error such as EMC influences, defective push-in connectors or cable damage are detected and located, even if they do not yet overstrain the self-healing capacity of the network.

Integration of standard Bus Terminals from Beckhoff

In addition to the new Bus Terminals with E-Bus connection (ELxxxx), all Bus Terminals from the familiar standard range with K-bus connection (KLxxxx) can be connected via the BK1120 or BK1250 Bus Coupler. This ensures compatibility and continuity with the existing Beckhoff Bus Terminal systems. Existing investments are protected.

3.2 The Beckhoff Bus Terminal system

Up to 256 Bus Terminals, with 1 to 16 I/O channels per signal form

The Bus Terminal system is the universal interface between a fieldbus system and the sensor / actuator level. A unit consists of a Bus Coupler as the head station, and up to 64 electronic series terminals, the last one being an end terminal. Up to 255 Bus Terminals can be connected via the K-bus extension. For each technical signal form, terminals are available with one, two, four or eight I/O channels, which can be mixed as required. All the terminal types have the same mechanical construction, so that difficulties of planning and design are minimized. The height and depth match the dimensions of compact terminal boxes.

Decentralized wiring of each I/O level

Fieldbus technology allows more compact forms of controller to be used. The I/O level does not have to be brought to the controller. The sensors and actuators can be wired decentrally, using minimum cable lengths. The controller can be installed at any location within the plant.

Industrial PCs as controllers

The use of an Industrial PC as the controller means that the operating and observing element can be implemented in the controller's hardware. The controller can therefore be located at an operating panel, in a control room, or at some similar place. The Bus Terminals form the decentralized input/output level of the controller in the control cabinet and the subsidiary terminal boxes. The power sector of the plant is also controlled over the bus system in addition to the sensor/actuator level. The Bus Terminal replaces the conventional series terminal as the wiring level in the control cabinet. The control cabinet can have smaller dimensions.

Bus Couplers for all usual bus systems

The Beckhoff Bus Terminal system unites the advantages of a bus system with the possibilities of the compact series terminal. Bus Terminals can be driven within all the usual bus systems, thus reducing the controller parts count. The Bus Terminals then behave like conventional connections for that bus system. All the performance features of the particular bus system are supported.

Mounting on standardized mounting rails

The installation is standardized thanks to the simple and space-saving mounting on a standardized mounting rail (EN 50022, 35 mm) and the direct wiring of actuators and sensors, without cross connections between the terminals. The consistent labelling scheme also contributes.

The small physical size and the great flexibility of the Bus Terminal system allows it to be used wherever a series terminal is also used. Every type of connection, such as analog, digital, serial or the direct connection of sensors can be implemented.

Modularity

The modular assembly of the terminal strip with Bus Terminals of various functions limits the number of unused channels to a maximum of one per function. The presence of two channels in one terminal is the optimum compromise of unused channels and the cost of each channel. The possibility of electrical isolation through potential feed terminals also helps to keep the number of unused channels low.

Display of the channel state

The integrated LEDs show the state of the channel at a location close to the sensors and actuators.

K-bus

The K-bus is the data path within a terminal strip. The K-bus is led through from the Bus Coupler through all the terminals via six contacts on the terminals' side walls. The end terminal terminates the K-bus. The user does not have to learn anything about the function of the K-bus or about the internal workings of the terminals and the Bus Coupler. Many software tools that can be supplied make project planning, configuration and operation easy.

Potential feed terminals for isolated groups

The operating voltage is passed on to following terminals via three power contacts. You can divide the terminal strip into arbitrary isolated groups by means of potential feed terminals. The potential feed terminals play no part in the control of the terminals, and can be inserted at any locations within the terminal strip.

Up to 64 Bus Terminals can be used in a terminal block, with optional K-bus extension for up to 256 Bus Terminals. This count does include potential feed terminals, but not the end terminal.

Bus Couplers for various fieldbus systems

Various Bus Couplers can be used to couple the electronic terminal strip quickly and easily to different fieldbus systems. It is also possible to convert to another fieldbus system at a later time. The Bus Coupler performs all the monitoring and control tasks that are necessary for operation of the connected Bus Terminals. The operation and configuration of the Bus Terminals is carried out exclusively by the Bus Coupler. Nevertheless, the parameters that have been set are stored in each Bus Terminal, and are retained in the event of voltage drop-out. Fieldbus, K-bus and I/O level are electrically isolated.

If the exchange of data over the fieldbus is prone to errors or fails for a period of time, register contents (such as counter states) are retained, digital outputs are cleared, and analog outputs take a value that can be configured for each output when commissioning. The default setting for analog outputs is 0 V or 0 mA. Digital outputs return in the inactive state. The timeout periods for the Bus Couplers correspond to the usual settings for the fieldbus system. When converting to a different bus system it is necessary to bear in mind the need to change the timeout periods if the bus cycle time is longer.

The interfaces

A Bus Coupler has six different methods of connection. These interfaces are designed as plug connectors and as spring-loaded terminals.

3.3 CoE Interface

General description

The CoE interface (CAN application protocol over EtherCAT)) is used for parameter management of EtherCAT devices. EtherCAT slaves or the EtherCAT master manage fixed (read only) or variable parameters which they require for operation, diagnostics or commissioning.

CoE parameters are arranged in a table hierarchy. In principle, the user has read access via the fieldbus. The EtherCAT master (TwinCAT System Manager) can access the local CoE lists of the slaves via EtherCAT in read or write mode, depending on the attributes.

Different CoE parameter types are possible, including string (text), integer numbers, Boolean values or larger byte fields. They can be used to describe a wide range of features. Examples of such parameters include manufacturer ID, serial number, process data settings, device name, calibration values for analog measurement or passwords.

The order is specified in two levels via hexadecimal numbering: (main)index, followed by subindex. The value ranges are

- Index: 0x0000 ...0xFFFF (0...65535_{dec})
- SubIndex: 0x00...0xFF (0...255_{dec})

A parameter localized in this way is normally written as 0x8010:07, with preceding "0x" to identify the hexadecimal numerical range and a colon between index and subindex.

The relevant ranges for EtherCAT fieldbus users are:

- 0x1000: This is where fixed identity information for the device is stored, including name, manufacturer, serial number etc., plus information about the current and available process data configurations.
- 0x8000: This is where the operational and functional parameters for all channels are stored, such as filter settings or output frequency.

Other important ranges are:

- 0x4000: here are the channel parameters for some EtherCAT devices. Historically, this was the first
 parameter area before the 0x8000 area was introduced. EtherCAT devices that were previously
 equipped with parameters in 0x4000 and changed to 0x8000 support both ranges for compatibility
 reasons and mirror internally.
- 0x6000: Input PDOs ("input" from the perspective of the EtherCAT master)
- 0x7000: Output PDOs ("output" from the perspective of the EtherCAT master)



Availability

Not every EtherCAT device must have a CoE list. Simple I/O modules without dedicated processor usually have no variable parameters and therefore no CoE list.

If a device has a CoE list, it is shown in the TwinCAT System Manager as a separate tab with a listing of the elements:

NOTE

Changes in the CoE directory (CAN over EtherCAT), program access

When using/manipulating the CoE parameters observe the general CoE notes in chapter "<u>CoE interface</u>" of the EtherCAT system documentation:

- Keep a startup list if components have to be replaced,
- Distinction between online/offline dictionary,
- Existence of current XML description (download from the Beckhoff website),
- "CoE-Reload" for resetting the changes
- Program access during operation via PLC (see <u>TwinCAT3 | PLC Library: Tc2 EtherCAT</u> and <u>Example</u> program R/W CoE)

Data management and function "NoCoeStorage"

Some parameters, particularly the setting parameters of the slave, are configurable and writeable. This can be done in write or read mode

- via the System Manager (Fig. "CoE Online" tab) by clicking This is useful for commissioning of the system/slaves. Click on the row of the index to be parameterized and enter a value in the "SetValue" dialog.
- from the control system/PLC via ADS, e.g. through blocks from the TcEtherCAT.lib library This is recommended for modifications while the system is running or if no System Manager or operating staff are available.

Data management

If slave CoE parameters are modified online, Beckhoff devices store any changes in a fail-safe manner in the EEPROM, i.e. the modified CoE parameters are still available after a restart. The situation may be different with other manufacturers.

An EEPROM is subject to a limited lifetime with respect to write operations. From typically 100,000 write operations onwards it can no longer be guaranteed that new (changed) data are reliably saved or are still readable. This is irrelevant for normal commissioning. However, if CoE parameters are continuously changed via ADS at machine runtime, it is quite possible for the lifetime limit to be reached. Support for the NoCoeStorage function, which suppresses the saving of changed CoE values, depends on the firmware version.

Please refer to the technical data in this documentation as to whether this applies to the respective device.

- If the function is supported: the function is activated by entering the code word 0x12345678 once in CoE 0xF008 and remains active as long as the code word is not changed. After switching the device on it is then inactive. Changed CoE values are not saved in the EEPROM and can thus be changed any number of times.
- Function is not supported: continuous changing of CoE values is not permissible in view of the lifetime limit.

Startup list

Changes in the local CoE list of the terminal are lost if the terminal is replaced. If a terminal is replaced with a new Beckhoff terminal, it will have the default settings. It is therefore advisable to link all changes in the CoE list of an EtherCAT slave with the Startup list of the slave, which is processed whenever the EtherCAT fieldbus is started. In this way a replacement EtherCAT slave can automatically be parameterized with the specifications of the user.

If EtherCAT slaves are used which are unable to store local CoE values permanently, the Startup list must be used.

Recommended approach for manual modification of CoE parameters

 Make the required change in the System Manager The values are stored locally in the EtherCAT slave • If the value is to be stored permanently, enter it in the Startup list. The order of the Startup entries is usually irrelevant.

The Startup list may already contain values that were configured by the System Manager based on the ESI specifications. Additional application-specific entries can be created.

Online/offline list

While working with the TwinCAT System Manager, a distinction has to be made whether the EtherCAT device is "available", i.e. switched on and linked via EtherCAT and therefore **online**, or whether a configuration is created **offline** without connected slaves.

In both cases a CoE list as shown in Fig. "CoE online tab" is displayed. The connectivity is shown as offline/ online.

- If the slave is offline
 - The offline list from the ESI file is displayed. In this case modifications are not meaningful or possible.
 - The configured status is shown under Identity.
 - No firmware or hardware version is displayed, since these are features of the physical device.
 - Offline is shown in red.

Channel-based order

The CoE list is available in EtherCAT devices that usually feature several functionally equivalent channels. For example, a 4-channel analog 0...10 V input terminal also has four logical channels and therefore four identical sets of parameter data for the channels. In order to avoid having to list each channel in the documentation, the placeholder "n" tends to be used for the individual channel numbers.

In the CoE system 16 indices, each with 255 subindices, are generally sufficient for representing all channel parameters. The channel-based order is therefore arranged in $16_{dec}/10_{hex}$ steps. The parameter range 0x8000 exemplifies this:

- Channel 0: parameter range 0x8000:00 ... 0x800F:255
- Channel 1: parameter range 0x8010:00 ... 0x801F:255
- Channel 2: parameter range 0x8020:00 ... 0x802F:255
- ...

This is generally written as 0x80n0.

Detailed information on the CoE interface can be found in the <u>EtherCAT system documentation</u> on the Beckhoff website.

3.4 EtherCAT State Machine

The state of the EtherCAT slave is controlled via the EtherCAT State Machine (ESM). Depending upon the state, different functions are accessible or executable in the EtherCAT slave. Specific commands must be sent by the EtherCAT master to the device in each state, particularly during the bootup of the slave.

A distinction is made between the following states:

- Init
- · Pre-Operational
- · Safe-Operational and
- Operational
- Boot

The regular state of each EtherCAT slave after bootup is the OP state.




Fig. 10: States of the EtherCAT State Machine

Init

After switch-on the EtherCAT slave in the *Init* state. No mailbox or process data communication is possible. The EtherCAT master initializes sync manager channels 0 and 1 for mailbox communication.

Pre-Operational (Pre-Op)

During the transition between *Init* and *Pre-Op* the EtherCAT slave checks whether the mailbox was initialized correctly.

In *Pre-Op* state mailbox communication is possible, but not process data communication. The EtherCAT master initializes the sync manager channels for process data (from sync manager channel 2), the FMMU channels and, if the slave supports configurable mapping, PDO mapping or the sync manager PDO assignment. In this state the settings for the process data transfer and perhaps terminal-specific parameters that may differ from the default settings are also transferred.

Safe-Operational (Safe-Op)

During transition between *Pre-Op* and *Safe-Op* the EtherCAT slave checks whether the sync manager channels for process data communication and, if required, the distributed clocks settings are correct. Before it acknowledges the change of state, the EtherCAT slave copies current input data into the associated DP-RAM areas of the EtherCAT slave controller (ECSC).

In *Safe-Op* state mailbox and process data communication is possible, although the slave keeps its outputs in a safe state, while the input data are updated cyclically.

• Outputs in SAFEOP state

The default set watchdog monitoring sets the outputs of the module in a safe state - depending on the settings in SAFEOP and OP - e.g. in OFF state. If this is prevented by deactivation of the watchdog monitoring in the module, the outputs can be switched or set also in the SAFEOP state.

Operational (Op)

Before the EtherCAT master switches the EtherCAT slave from *Safe-Op* to *Op* it must transfer valid output data.

In the *Op* state the slave copies the output data of the masters to its outputs. Process data and mailbox communication is possible.

Boot

In the *Boot* state the slave firmware can be updated. The *Boot* state can only be reached via the *Init* state.

In the *Boot* state mailbox communication via the *file access over EtherCAT* (FoE) protocol is possible, but no other mailbox communication and no process data communication.

4 Mounting and wiring

4.1 Instructions for ESD protection

NOTE

Destruction of the devices by electrostatic discharge possible!

The devices contain components at risk from electrostatic discharge caused by improper handling.

- Please ensure you are electrostatically discharged and avoid touching the contacts of the device directly.
- Avoid contact with highly insulating materials (synthetic fibers, plastic film etc.).
- Surroundings (working place, packaging and personnel) should by grounded probably, when handling with the devices.
- Each assembly must be terminated at the right hand end with a KL9010 bus end terminal, to ensure the protection class and ESD protection.




Fig. 11: Spring contacts of the Beckhoff I/O components

4.2 Mounting

4.2.1 Installation on mounting rails

Risk of electric shock and damage of device!

Bring the bus terminal system into a safe, powered down state before starting installation, disassembly or wiring of the bus terminals!

The Bus Terminal system and is designed for mounting in a control cabinet or terminal box.

Assembly




Fig. 12: Attaching on mounting rail

The bus coupler and bus terminals are attached to commercially available 35 mm mounting rails (DIN rails according to EN 60715) by applying slight pressure:

- 1. First attach the fieldbus coupler to the mounting rail.
- 2. The bus terminals are now attached on the right-hand side of the fieldbus coupler. Join the components with tongue and groove and push the terminals against the mounting rail, until the lock clicks onto the mounting rail.

If the terminals are clipped onto the mounting rail first and then pushed together without tongue and groove, the connection will not be operational! When correctly assembled, no significant gap should be visible between the housings.



Fixing of mounting rails

The locking mechanism of the terminals and couplers extends to the profile of the mounting rail. At the installation, the locking mechanism of the components must not come into conflict with the fixing bolts of the mounting rail. To mount the mounting rails with a height of 7.5 mm under the terminals and couplers, you should use flat mounting connections (e.g. countersunk screws or blind rivets).

Disassembly




Fig. 13: Disassembling of terminal

Each terminal is secured by a lock on the mounting rail, which must be released for disassembly:

- 1. Pull the terminal by its orange-colored lugs approximately 1 cm away from the mounting rail. In doing so for this terminal the mounting rail lock is released automatically and you can pull the terminal out of the bus terminal block easily without excessive force.
- 2. Grasp the released terminal with thumb and index finger simultaneous at the upper and lower grooved housing surfaces and pull the terminal out of the bus terminal block.

Connections within a bus terminal block

The electric connections between the Bus Coupler and the Bus Terminals are automatically realized by joining the components:

- The six spring contacts of the K-Bus/E-Bus deal with the transfer of the data and the supply of the Bus Terminal electronics.
- The power contacts deal with the supply for the field electronics and thus represent a supply rail within the bus terminal block. The power contacts are supplied via terminals on the Bus Coupler (up to 24 V) or for higher voltages via power feed terminals.




Power Contacts

During the design of a bus terminal block, the pin assignment of the individual Bus Terminals must be taken account of, since some types (e.g. analog Bus Terminals or digital 4-channel Bus Terminals) do not or not fully loop through the power contacts. Power Feed Terminals (KL91xx, KL92xx or EL91xx, EL92xx) interrupt the power contacts and thus represent the start of a new supply rail.

PE power contact

The power contact labeled PE can be used as a protective earth. For safety reasons this contact mates first when plugging together, and can ground short-circuit currents of up to 125 A.






Fig. 14: Power contact on left side

NOTE

Possible damage of the device

Note that, for reasons of electromagnetic compatibility, the PE contacts are capacitatively coupled to the mounting rail. This may lead to incorrect results during insulation testing or to damage on the terminal (e.g. disruptive discharge to the PE line during insulation testing of a consumer with a nominal voltage of 230 V). For insulation testing, disconnect the PE supply line at the Bus Coupler or the Power Feed Terminal! In order to decouple further feed points for testing, these Power Feed Terminals can be released and pulled at least 10 mm from the group of terminals.

A WARNING

Risk of electric shock!

The PE power contact must not be used for other potentials!

4.2.2 Installation instructions for enhanced mechanical load capacity

Risk of injury through electric shock and damage to the device!

Bring the Bus Terminal system into a safe, de-energized state before starting mounting, disassembly or wiring of the Bus Terminals!

Additional installation instructions

For terminals with enhanced mechanical load capacity, the following additional installation instructions apply:

- · The enhanced mechanical load capacity is valid for all permissible installation positions
- Use a mounting rail according to EN 60715 TH35-15
- Fix the terminal segment on both sides of the mounting rail with a mechanical fixture, e.g. an earth terminal or reinforced end clamp
- The maximum total extension of the terminal segment (without coupler) is: 64 terminals (12 mm mounting with) or 32 terminals (24 mm mounting with)
- Avoid deformation, twisting, crushing and bending of the mounting rail during edging and installation of the rail
- The mounting points of the mounting rail must be set at 5 cm intervals
- Use countersunk head screws to fasten the mounting rail
- The free length between the strain relief and the wire connection should be kept as short as possible. A distance of approx. 10 cm should be maintained to the cable duct.

4.2.3 Disposal



Products marked with a crossed-out wheeled bin shall not be discarded with the normal waste stream. The device is considered as waste electrical and electronic equipment. The national regulations for the disposal of waste electrical and electronic equipment must be observed.

4.2.4 Installation positions


NOTE

Constraints regarding installation position and operating temperature range

Please refer to the technical data for a terminal to ascertain whether any restrictions regarding the installation position and/or the operating temperature range have been specified. When installing high power dissipation terminals ensure that an adequate spacing is maintained between other components above and below the terminal in order to guarantee adequate ventilation!

Optimum installation position (standard)

The optimum installation position requires the mounting rail to be installed horizontally and the connection surfaces of the EL/KL terminals to face forward (see Fig. *Recommended distances for standard installation position*). The terminals are ventilated from below, which enables optimum cooling of the electronics through convection. "From below" is relative to the acceleration of gravity.

Compliance with the distances shown in Fig. *Recommended distances for standard installation position* is recommended.

Other installation positions

All other installation positions are characterized by different spatial arrangement of the mounting rail - see Fig Other installation positions.

The minimum distances to ambient specified above also apply to these installation positions.




Fig. 16: Other installation positions




Fig. 17: BK1120, BK1150 - Contact assignment




Fig. 18: BK1250 - Contact assignment

4.3.3 **Power supply, potential groups**

Bus Coupler power supply

The Bus Couplers require a 24 V_{DC} supply for their operation. The connection is made by means of the upper spring-loaded terminals labelled 24 V and 0 V. The supply voltage is used by the Bus Coupler electronics and for direct voltage generation for the K-bus. The voltage generation for the K-bus takes place in a DC/DC converter without electrical isolation.

The BK1xxx units supply the K-bus with max. 1750 mA K-bus current. Power feed terminals are to be inserted if the added terminals require more current.

Input for power contacts

The bottom six connections with spring-loaded terminals can be used to feed the supply for the peripherals. The spring-loaded terminals are joined in pairs to a power contact. The feed for the power contacts has no connection to the voltage supply for the Bus Coupler. The design of the feed permits voltages of up to 24 V. The assignment in pairs and the electrical connection between feed terminal contacts allows the connection wires to be looped through to various terminal points. The current load via the power contacts may not permanently exceed 10 A; the supply line must therefore be protected by a 10 A fuse (slow-blow).

Power contacts

On the right hand face of the Bus Coupler there are three spring contacts for the power contact connections. The spring contacts are hidden in slots so that they can not be accidentally touched. By attaching a Bus Terminal the blade contacts on the left hand side of the Bus Terminal are connected to the spring contacts. The tongue and groove guides on the top and bottom of the Bus Coupler and of the Bus Terminals guarantees that the power contacts mate securely.

The current load of the power contacts may not permanently exceed 10 A.

Electrical isolation

The bus couplers operate by means of three independent potential groups. The supply voltage feeds the Kbus electronics in the bus coupler and the K-bus itself, which are electrically isolated. The supply voltage is also used to generate the operating voltage for the fieldbus.

Note: All the Bus Terminals are electrically isolated from the K-bus. The K-bus is thus electrically isolated from everything else.




Fig. 19: BK1xxx - Potential diagram

4.3.4 Ethernet cable

Transmission standards

10Base5

The transmission medium for 10Base5 consists of a thick coaxial cable ("yellow cable") with a max. transmission speed of 10 Mbaud arranged in a line topology with branches (drops) each of which is connected to one network device. Because all the devices are in this case connected to a common transmission medium, it is inevitable that collisions occur often in 10Base5.

10Base2

10Base2 (Cheaper net) is a further development of 10Base5, and has the advantage that the coaxial cable is cheaper and, being more flexible, is easier to lay. It is possible for several devices to be connected to one 10Base2 cable. It is frequent for branches from a 10Base5 backbone to be implemented in 10Base2.

10BaseT

Describes a twisted pair cable for 10 Mbaud. The network here is constructed as a star. It is no longer the case that every device is attached to the same medium. This means that a broken cable no longer results in failure of the entire network. The use of switches as star couplers enables collisions to be reduced. Using full-duplex connections they can even be entirely avoided.

100BaseT

Twisted pair cable for 100 MBaud. It is necessary to use a higher cable quality and to employ appropriate hubs or switches in order to achieve the higher data rate.

10BaseF

The 10BaseF standard describes several optical fiber versions.

Short description of the 10BaseT and 100BaseT cable types

Twisted-pair copper cable for star topologies, where the distance between two devices may not exceed 100 meters.

UTP

Unshielded twisted-pair This type of cable belongs to category 3, and is not recommended for use in an industrial environment.

S/UTP

Screened/unshielded twisted-pair (shielded with copper braid) Has an overall shield of copper braid to reduce influence of external interference. This cable is recommended for use with Bus Couplers.

FTP

Foiled shielded twisted-pair (shielded with aluminium foil) This cable has an outer screen of laminated aluminium and plastic foil.

S/FTP

Screened/foiled-shielded twisted-pair (shielded with copper braid and aluminium foil) Has a laminated aluminium screen with a copper braid on top. Such cables can provide up to 70 dB reduction in interference power.

STP

Shielded twisted-pair Describes a cable with an outer screen, without defining the nature of the screen any more closely.

S/STP

Screened/shielded twisted pair (wires are individually shielded) This identification refers to a cable with a shield for each of the two wires as well as an overall shield.

ITP

Industrial Twisted-Pair.

The structure is similar to that of S/STP, but, in contrast to S/STP, it has only one pair of conductors.

4.3.5 EtherCAT wiring

The cable length between two EtherCAT devices must not exceed 100 m.

Cables and connectors

For connecting EtherCAT devices only Ethernet cables that meet the requirements of at least category 5 (CAt5) according to EN 50173 or ISO/IEC 11801 should be used. EtherCAT uses 4 wires for signal transfer.

EtherCAT uses RJ45 connectors. The pin assignment is compatible with the Ethernet standard (ISO/IEC 8802-3).

Due to automatic cable detection (auto-crossing) symmetric (1:1) or cross-over cables can be used between EtherCAT devices from Beckhoff.

E-bus supply

NOTE

Attention! Malfunction possible!

The same ground potential must be used for the E-bus supply of all EtherCAT terminals in a terminal block!

4.4 ATEX - Special conditions (extended temperature range)

WARNING

Observe the special conditions for the intended use of Beckhoff fieldbus components with extended temperature range (ET) in potentially explosive areas (directive 2014/34/EU)!

- The certified components are to be installed in a suitable housing that guarantees a protection class of at least IP54 in accordance with EN 60079-15! The environmental conditions during use are thereby to be taken into account!
- For dust (only the fieldbus components of certificate no. KEMA 10ATEX0075 X Issue 9): The equipment shall be installed in a suitable enclosure providing a degree of protection of IP54 according to EN 60079-31 for group IIIA or IIIB and IP6X for group IIIC, taking into account the environmental conditions under which the equipment is used!
- If the temperatures during rated operation are higher than 70°C at the feed-in points of cables, lines or pipes, or higher than 80°C at the wire branching points, then cables must be selected whose temperature data correspond to the actual measured temperature values!
- Observe the permissible ambient temperature range of -25 to 60°C for the use of Beckhoff fieldbus components with extended temperature range (ET) in potentially explosive areas!
- Measures must be taken to protect against the rated operating voltage being exceeded by more than 40% due to short-term interference voltages!
- The individual terminals may only be unplugged or removed from the Bus Terminal system if the supply voltage has been switched off or if a non-explosive atmosphere is ensured!
- The connections of the certified components may only be connected or disconnected if the supply voltage has been switched off or if a non-explosive atmosphere is ensured!
- The fuses of the KL92xx/EL92xx power feed terminals may only be exchanged if the supply voltage has been switched off or if a non-explosive atmosphere is ensured!
- Address selectors and ID switches may only be adjusted if the supply voltage has been switched off or if a non-explosive atmosphere is ensured!



5 Parameterization and commissioning

5.1 Start-up behavior of the Bus Coupler

Immediately after being switched on, the Bus Coupler checks, in the course of a self test, all the functions of its components and the communication on the K-bus/E-bus. The red I/O LED blinks while this is happening After completion of the self-test, the Bus Coupler starts to test the attached Bus Terminals (the "Bus Terminal Test"), and reads in the configuration. The Bus Terminal configuration is used to generate an internal structure list, which is not accessible from outside. In case of an error, the Bus Coupler enters the *Stop* state. Once the start-up has completed without error, the Bus Coupler enters the *fieldbus start* state.




Fig. 20: Flow chart showing start-up behavior of the Bus Coupler

The Bus Coupler can be made to enter the normal operating state by switching it on again once the fault has been rectified.

5.2 EKxxxx - Optional Distributed Clocks support

Basic principles Distributed Clocks (DC)

The EtherCAT Distributed Clocks system comprises local clocks that are integrated in the EtherCAT slaves and are synchronized by the EtherCAT master via special datagrams. Not all EtherCAT slaves support the Distributed Clocks procedure. It is only supported by slaves whose function requires it. In the TwinCAT System Manager a slave indicates its DC capability by showing "DC" in the settings dialog.

Once of these local clocks is the reference clock, based on which all other clocks are synchronized. See also explanatory notes in the <u>Basic EtherCAT documentation</u>. The reference clock must be the first DC-capable EtherCAT slave. By default TwinCAT therefore selects the first DC-capable device as reference clock. This is shown (and can be modified by the user) under advanced properties of the EtherCAT master. The standard setting should not be changed, except in cases where external synchronization is recommended in the relevant documentation, for example.

The figure shows how TwinCAT selects the EL1252 as reference clock by default, since the preceding components do not support DC.

Settings EtherCAT device

System and infrastructure devices such as EK1100 or EK1122 couplers and junction etc. do not require Distributed Clocks to function properly. Nevertheless, it may be topologically expedient to designate the first coupler in an EtherCAT system as reference clock, for example. For this reason, from a certain level the infrastructure components are able to operate as reference clocks, based on special configuration settings.

To ensure that TwinCAT uses such a component as DC reference clock, a manual intervention during the configuration setup is required, as shown here using the EK1100 as an example.

The checkboxes "Cyclic Mode Enable" and "Use as potential Reference Clock" must be set.




Fig. 23: TwinCAT setting for using this component as reference clock

Activation of Distributed Clocks support

The (synchronization) procedure described here is only successful for the components described above. The checkboxes can be set for other components, too, although the hardware does not support this function, unless specified in the respective documentation. In particularly, please note that after commissioning the component may not be replaced with a previous version without DC support.

5.3 KL register communication

5.3.1 Parameterization of K-bus terminals

If a K-bus terminal supports this kind of parameterization, the parameters can be changed via the register communication. The parameters are managed in so-called registers in the terminal. They can be changed during the startup phase or online during operation.

The available parameters/registers are described in the corresponding terminal documentation. In these chapters, only the route to the registers via EtherCAT is described.

The following 3 routes are available; all require the coupler as a gateway:

- Change during the EtherCAT startup phase via the coupler's <u>CoE startup list [▶ 40]</u> This ensures that the terminal is parameterized correctly and immediately, even after the terminal is exchanged.
- Change during operation
 - via EtherCAT CoE access to the coupler

via <u>AoE access [▶ 45]</u> (ADS over EtherCAT) from a TwinCAT system by means of ADS commands on the K-bus terminal

As a rule, it is not necessary to reboot the K-bus terminal after a parameter change; see terminal documentation.

KS2000 configuration software

The <u>KS2000 configuration software</u> for parameterizing K-bus terminals runs on Windows IPCs and can communicate with the terminals and the upstream coupler via two communication channels:

- Internal ADS.
- External via a serial RS232 COM cable or a USB cable. Both are available from Beckhoff. A KS2000 interface at the coupler (e.g. BK1120) is a prerequisite for external access.




Fig. 24: Register access on K-bus terminals



ADS access

In contrast to COM access via a cable, ADS access is not limited to the local IPC platform. The routing capabilities of each TwinCAT IPC enable the KL registers to be accessed from other TwinCAT stations.

5.3.2 Configuration of KL terminals via EtherCAT

The following is an explanation of how register communication with the KL terminals is parameterized during the EtherCAT start-up.

This ensures that the KL terminal used always contains the desired register set, even if the terminal (hardware) is exchanged, because the register data is written to the KL terminal again at the next start-up of the system or EtherCAT.

The principle:

- a set of calls is stored in the CoE startup list of the BK11x0/BK1250 for each terminal to be parameterized.
- the entering and cancelling of the code word must thereby be included if required.
- the startup entries are processed in succession by the TwinCAT EtherCAT master during the start-up.
- in doing so, confirmed mailbox communication takes place, so that the next entry will be initiated only when the previous one has been successfully completed.
- no check is made of whether certain values already exist in the KL terminal; the defined startup entries will be written to the terminal position in all cases.
- the startup entries are to be sent in the PREOP -> SAFEOP transition.

This is the process to be adhered to for each terminal:

- entry of the terminal number to CoE 0x427F: 00 as a 2-byte value the first KL terminal after the BK11x0/BK1250 also has the number 1; accordingly consecutive.
- if necessary: set the code word in register 31 0x4280:20 = 0x1235.
- List the register values sequentially; subindex_{hex} = register number + 1
 e.g. 0x4280: 21 = 0x0800
 See table, among others, for the required CoE index.
- if the code word was needed: delete the code word in order to accept data 0x4280:20 = 0.
- deselect terminal selection by CoE 0x427F: 00 = 0

Information for the register values

- a KL terminal can have a maximum of 4 parameterisable channels/register pages; see the corresponding terminal documentation.
- each channel/register page has n registers, 0 63 is usual.
- each register is accessible via the CoE sub-index: **Subindex**_{hex} = **Register number + 1**.
- the following assignments apply to the channels/register pages:

Code word

The user parameters in registers 32 - 47 can only be changed if the code word 0x1235 is written in register 31. Register 31 must be set back to 0 for non-volatile storage of the modified user parameters in the terminal.

Please refer to the corresponding terminal documentation for access to the register.

Example

TwinCAT 2:11 b1539 and a BK1120 with firmware B8 were used in the following example.

In an existing configuration (scanned or manually created), the user scaling (offset) of the KL3314 is to be changed in the startup list of the BK1120 coupler in order to ensure that the desired scaling is also saved in the terminal in the event of the terminal being exchanged.

2 entries have already been created: selection of terminal 3 and setting of the code word.

Now the user scaling (offset) will be set in register 33 (see terminal documentation). A right click opens the "Insert" dialog.




Fig. 25: Insert dialog

5.3.3 Online parameterization of KL terminals via CoE

In the same way as with the CoE startup entry (CANopen over EtherCAT), online access to a KL terminal is also possible via the CoE directory of the BK11x0/BK1250 EtherCAT coupler used. Using this route, access to the coupler-internal tables or to the registers in the terminals is possible.

The coupler-internal tables are displayed in the CoE directory; the terminal registers can be dynamically displayed and edited via the 0x4280ff indices.

- the System Manager logger window shows "SDO Abort".

5.3.4 Online parameterization of KL terminals via AoE

Access via AoE (ADS over EtherCAT) is useful from TwinCAT 2:11. An additional AoE NetId is required for the coupler used, so that the TwinCAT-internal ADS router can access it. It is useful to link this AoE NetId with the PLC program.

The same procedure is described <u>here [▶ 66]</u> to access the KL terminals with the KS2000 software via ADS.




Fig. 31: Activation of the AoE NetID

The AoE NetId can be generated in the advanced settings of the BK11x0/BK1250. Optionally, it can be initialized with a pre-specified (unique!) start value.

After a TwinCAT restart it is available in the ADS router and can be used, for example, from the PLC.

5.3.5 Beckhoff coupler tables

The Beckhoff BK/BCxxxx Fieldbus Couplers feature internal information lists referred to as tables that are identified by unique numbers. The BK11x0/BK1250 maps these tables in its CoE directory, see <u>Object</u> <u>overview [▶ 54]</u>.

Tables 0, 9, 90, 98, 99, 100 and 127 are available.

Table 9

Table 9, which maps the scanned state of the added terminals after the coupler is switched on, i.e. the status with which the terminals have identified themselves at the coupler, is helpful for terminal bus analysis. The first 63 K-bus devices are listed in CoE index 0x4012 and/or its subindices, the remaining devices in CoE index 0x4013, see Fig. *Table 9 with terminal type*.

SubIndex 1 is the "name" of the coupler itself, the terminals follow from subindex 2. Subindex 0 contains the number of terminals that were found. Since the subindex 1 contains the coupler name itself, the value in subindex 0 corresponds to the number of terminals, including the KL9010.

5.4 TwinCAT System Manager

5.4.1 BK1120, BK1150 - configuration overview

In the TwinCAT System Manager, in Config mode under Devices enter the BK1120 / BK1150 as EtherCAT device (Fig. *TwinCAT tree showing BK1120 as example*). Any Bus Couplers already connected to the network can also be read. This will cause all the Bus Couplers with Bus Terminals and their configurations to be loaded. You can then adapt these to meet your requirements.




Fig. 33: TwinCAT tree showing BK1120 as example

5.4.2 BK1250 - configuration overview

The BK1250 can be added in the TwinCAT System Manager (Config mode) as a further box under a corresponding coupler (e.g. EK1100) by right-clicking in the terminal network (Fig. *TwinCAT tree BK1250*). If the Bus Coupler is already integrated in the network, it is automatically added as a box during scanning. Subsidiary Bus Terminals and their configuration are also uploaded.




Fig. 34: TwinCAT tree BK1250

The EtherCAT cycle time with which the couplers can be operated should be considered in conjunction with the achieved K-bus cycle time. The cycle time achieved with the K-bus terminals is shown in the BK1250 tab (or BK1120 / BK1150).




Fig. 40: BK1250, "BK1250" tab

If the EtherCAT cycle time exceeds the K-bus cycle time both systems operate in synchronous mode. The Kbus is started after an EtherCAT telegram and copies its inputs into the memory. They are retrieved with the next EtherCAT telegram, i.e. the inputs are always one cycle old.

If the EtherCAT cycle is shorter than the K-bus cycle, the K-bus operates asynchronous relative to EtherCAT. Faster polling than "Estimated Cycle (offline)" is therefore possible but may lead to outdated input data or outputs not being set in time via the K-bus.

The EtherCAT cycle applied to the BK1120 / BK1150 (BK1250) should therefore be significantly greater than the "Estimated Cycle (offline)" (min. 250 µs, depending on the Bus Terminal configuration). Online control in the system through "Max. Cycle (online)" or "CouplerState" is recommended.




Fig. 41: Configuration example for explaining the process image




Fig. 43: TwinCAT System Manager: EtherCAT tab for Box BK11x0/BK1250




Fig. 49: Opening the *. tnzip archive

The number blocks are placed in brackets there next to each computer name of a target system.

6 Error handling and diagnosis

6.1 LEDs

After switching on, the Bus Coupler immediately checks the connected configuration. Error-free start-up is signaled by the red LED *I/O ERR* being extinguished. If the *I/O ERR* LED blinks, an error in the area of the terminals is indicated. The frequency and number of flashes indicate the error code (see below).

The BK1120 / BK1150 Bus Coupler has a green LED *Link/Act In / Link/Act Out* at the RJ45 sockets, which indicates the fieldbus status.

The *RUN* and *ERROR* LEDs (for BK1120: center top, for BK1150: left row of the LED prism) indicate the state of the EtherCAT state machine.

On the upper right hand side of the BK1120 are two more green LEDs that indicate the supply voltage. The left hand LED indicates the presence of the 24 V supply for the Bus Coupler. The right hand LED indicates the presence of the supply to the power contacts. At the BK1150, the diagnostic LEDs are on the right side of the LED prism, as shown in Fig. *BK1120, BK1150 - Diagnostic LEDs at Bus Coupler*.




Fig. 51: BK1120, BK1150 - Diagnostic LEDs at Bus Coupler




Fig. 52: Diagnostic LEDs at Bus Coupler BK1250

The process data scope is incorrect. The BK11x0/BK1250 is set by the EtherCAT master based on the EtherCAT extent of process data according to the configured KL terminals. Before that the coupler scans its KL terminals and establishes its internal process data image based on their message. If the two process data do not match, the system reports a SyncManager error.

Use the KS2000 software or correct CoE startup entries to ensure that a KL terminal does not report with an alternative process data format that may differ from the TwinCAT configuration, for example.

Syntax of the serial number

Structure of the serial number: KK YY FF HH

- KK week of production (CW, calendar week) YY year of production
- FF firmware version
- HH hardware version

Example with serial number 34 06 08 02:

34 - week of production 34

- 06 year of production 2006
- 08 firmware version 08
- 02 Hardware-Stand 02

7.4 Version identification of EtherCAT devices

Designation

A Beckhoff EtherCAT device has a 14-digit designation, made up of

- · family key
- type
- version
- revision

Notes

- The elements mentioned above result in the **technical designation**. EL3314-0000-0016 is used in the example below.
- EL3314-0000 is the order identifier, in the case of "-0000" usually abbreviated to EL3314. "-0016" is the EtherCAT revision.
- The order identifier is made up of
 - family key (EL, EP, CU, ES, KL, CX, etc.)
 - type (3314)
 - version (-0000)
- The **revision** -0016 shows the technical progress, such as the extension of features with regard to the EtherCAT communication, and is managed by Beckhoff.

In principle, a device with a higher revision can replace a device with a lower revision, unless specified otherwise, e.g. in the documentation.

Associated and synonymous with each revision there is usually a description (ESI, EtherCAT Slave Information) in the form of an XML file, which is available for download from the Beckhoff web site. From 2014/01 the revision is shown on the outside of the IP20 terminals, see Fig. *"EL5021 EL terminal, standard IP20 IO device with batch number and revision ID (since 2014/01)"*.

 The type, version and revision are read as decimal numbers, even if they are technically saved in hexadecimal.

Identification number

Beckhoff EtherCAT devices from the different lines have different kinds of identification numbers:

Production lot/batch number/serial number/date code/D number

The serial number for Beckhoff IO devices is usually the 8-digit number printed on the device or on a sticker. The serial number indicates the configuration in delivery state and therefore refers to a whole production batch, without distinguishing the individual modules of a batch.

Structure of the serial number: KK YY FF HH

```
KK - week of production (CW, calendar week)
YY - year of production
FF - firmware version
HH - hardware version
```

Example with serial number 12 06 3A 02:

- 12 production week 12
- 06 production year 2006
- 3A firmware version 3A
- 02 hardware version 02

Exceptions can occur in the **IP67 area**, where the following syntax can be used (see respective device documentation):

Syntax: D ww yy x y z u

D - prefix designation ww - calendar week yy - year x - firmware version of the bus PCB y - hardware version of the bus PCB z - firmware version of the I/O PCB u - hardware version of the I/O PCB

Example: D.22081501 calendar week 22 of the year 2008 firmware version of bus PCB: 1 hardware version of bus PCB: 5 firmware version of I/O PCB: 0 (no firmware necessary for this PCB) hardware version of I/O PCB: 1

Unique serial number/ID, ID number

In addition, in some series each individual module has its own unique serial number.




Fig. 61: EP1908-0002 IP67 EtherCAT Safety Box with batch number/ date code 071201FF and unique serial number 00346070

7.4.1 Beckhoff Identification Code (BIC)

The Beckhoff Identification Code (BIC) is increasingly being applied to Beckhoff products to uniquely identify the product. The BIC is represented as a Data Matrix Code (DMC, code scheme ECC200), the content is based on the ANSI standard MH10.8.2-2016.

The BIC will be introduced step by step across all product groups.

Depending on the product, it can be found in the following places:

- · on the packaging unit
- directly on the product (if space suffices)
- on the packaging unit and the product

The BIC is machine-readable and contains information that can also be used by the customer for handling and product management.

Each piece of information can be uniquely identified using the so-called data identifier (ANSI MH10.8.2-2016). The data identifier is followed by a character string. Both together have a maximum length according to the table below. If the information is shorter, spaces are added to it. The data under positions 1 to 4 are always available.

The following information is contained:

BTN

An important component of the BIC is the Beckhoff Traceability Number (BTN, item no. 2). The BTN is a unique serial number consisting of eight characters that will replace all other serial number systems at Beckhoff in the long term (e.g. batch designations on IO components, previous serial number range for safety products, etc.). The BTN will also be introduced step by step, so it may happen that the BTN is not yet coded in the BIC.
